## Working Safely with Chainsaws

  - a. Basic parts: bar, chain, handle, etc...

- 3. Safety requirements when handling a chainsaw
  - a. Chainsaw starting procedure
    - i. Ground start
    - ii. Leg lock method
    - iii. Drop start (not for the inexperienced)
  - b. Carrying the saw
    - i. Saw at side bar pointed backwards
    - ii. Saw can be running when walking for short distances. Chain brake on!
  - c. Proper cutting stance and grip
    - i. Stand to the left of the path of kickback
    - ii. Bend knees and make sure you have good footing.
    - iii. Both hands on the saw (left thumb wrapped under front handle)
    - iv. Never reach above shoulder height to cut
    - v. Let the saw work for you. If you must push down, you probably need to sharpen.

- 4. Hazards associated with chainsaws
  - a. Kickback and kickback zone!
  - b. Maintain a distance of at least 10 ft. when working near another saw operator.
  - c. Chainsaw fatigue
  - d. Stay off ladders.
- 5. Mechanics of the chainsaw (reactive forces) when cutting
  - a. Push and pull forces with a saw
  - b. Tension and compression
- 6. Proper method of felling trees
  - a. Assess the tree and felling site
    - i. Identify hazards
    - ii. Tree height and lean
    - iii. Determine the lay
    - iv. Establish an escape route
  - b. Prepare Felling site
    - i. Protect people and property
  - c. Execute Felling Cuts and Retreat
    - i. Cutting the notch
    - ii. Making the backcut
    - iii. Retreating from the work area
    - iv. Reading the stump and cutting the stump
  - d. Felling aids
    - i. Wedges
    - ii. Ropes
    - iii. Woodsman's axe
    - iv. Winch's and rope pullers.
